## Court to Help Vets Accused of Crimes get Help



A Veteran Trauma Court is officially opening in Colorado Springs to help veterans who may be suffering from post traumatic stress disorder or other war injuries and who get in trouble with the law.

The court would be similar to other veterans' courts established across the country, including Buffalo, N.Y., Anchorage, Alaska, Orange County, Calif., and Tulsa, Okla. In those courts, veterans accused of crimes receive reduced sentences or dismissal of charges if they comply with terms of their plea agreement, which may include seeking treatment.

El Paso County officials had a news conference Last week and announce the official opening of the court, which is a five year project that expects to help approximately 1,500 veterans.

## STOP Family Violence Coalition Announces "Open Doors Campaign" at HBA Home & Garden Show

In 2008, El Paso County Department of Human Services received over 11,000 reports of child abuse, the highest number of calls in the state and 8% higher than the next closest county which is Denver. In 2008, 891 incidents of domestic violence were reported in the 80906 zip code and over 330 victims suffered sexual abuse in El Paso County.

To raise community awareness around these alarming statistics, the STOP Family Violence Coalition will display the artists painted doors from their "Open Doors" campaign at this year's HBA Home and Garden Show. Through the "Open Doors" campaign, the STOP Family Violence Coalition is building awareness around the issue of family violence in El Paso County and to challenge the community to put an end to family violence.

She is especially interested in how to create family environments which enhance the growth and development of both parents and children, and she finds her work with both very rewarding.
