

What a CASA Volunteer DOES and DOES NOT

The CASA gathers information, advocates for the child, and helps the child understand what is going on. Judges depend on CASA volunteers to help them make the best decisions. To help you better understand your role, here is what a CASA DOES and DOES NOT do.

| DOES | DOES NOT |
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| Become an advocate for a child who already has an open Dependency & Neglect Case | Remove children from their homes |
| Get to know the child and the child's family | Become the child's foster parent |
| Visit the child where he or she is living | Take the child to the advocate's home or introduce the child to the advocate's family |
| Speak to people the child lives with | Supervise visits between a child and his or her family |
| Focus on the present by talking with teachers, doctors, foster parents, therapists, social workers and others that might know how the child is doing. | Try to find out what happened in the family before CASA became involved |
| Take the child out for a special treat or meal every now and then if comfortable doing so | Have the requirement to drive the child or family, or to buy gifts for the child |
| Listen to the thoughts and feelings of the child | Act like a parent to the child or try to tell others what to do |
| Remain neutral and objective throughout the case | Choose sides between people involved in the case |
| Take notes, write reports to tell the judge what is going on, and attend hearings and meetings regarding the case | Tell anyone outside of the case about the child's life or circumstances |
| Obtain copies of all court papers on the case, and make recommendations in court regarding the child's best interest | Make any final decisions regarding the case |
